## The Counter-Reformation Posting the Church's Response

The Catholic Church was slow to respond to the challenges of the reformation and it was not until the 1540s that a serious response was mounted. In its response the church did not rely solely on intimidation but launched a multi-pronged offensive to suppress the Protestants and to reclaim the hearts and minds of converts.

For this assignment you must take on the role of an agent of the church. Employed in the Counter-Reformation it is your job to persuade the people of northern Europe to reject Protestantism and to come back to the Holy Roman Church. In short, you are to convince the public of the effectiveness of the Roman Catholic Church against the heresy of Protestant reformers. Your role is not that different from the "spin doctors" of contemporary politics. Your effort to persuade should include a clear and concise outline of the church's actions and an indication of the benefits of those actions – both in this and the next world.

Format: Your response to the Reformation should be aimed at the lay people of northern Europe (it is important that you consider your audience when writing your response). It should take the form of an announcement to be posted or read in public places and to fairly large audiences. It should be persuasive and convincing but also easily understood and to the point. Your response should be 250 - 500 words. It should be printed on one side of one  $8\frac{1}{2} \times 17$  piece of paper.
